INSTRUCTIONS FOR FILLING OUT DOUBLE BAR/BAT MITZVAH ALIYAH SHEET

PARENTS' PRAYER - This is the one line on which you will not be putting a name! We know that you, as parents are saying this prayer to your child. You will receive a packet of suggested prayers. We ask that you write on this line the number of the page of the prayer you pick, or "original" if you plan to write your own prayer. (Please note that this must <u>not</u> be a "speech"!!) If you write your own, look through the packet to get a sense of the nature of a <u>prayer</u>, and please e-mail or provide a hardcopy of this to either Rabbi Leib at least one month prior to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

The Roman numerals below correspond with those on the aliyah sheet

With the exception of the Torah blessings, you will be sharing the bimah with the family of your child's Bar/Bat Mitzvah partner.

I. As do many congregations, we pass the Torah through the generations of your family to your Bar/Bat Mitzvah. We ask that you have **ONE** representative from each generation pass the Torah. The representatives can by in **ANY** combination you wish. In other words, you may pass from maternal great-grandmother to maternal grandmother to daughter if you want, but you may also pass from paternal great-grandfather to maternal grandmother to father to son or daughter.

<u>PLEASE NOTE THAT FOR THE REST OF THIS SHEET YOU ARE TO ENTER ONLY ONE PERSON PER LINE</u>. IF YOU HAVE MORE THAN ONE NAME ON A LINE WE WILL HAVE TO TAKE ONE OFF, WHICH IS DIFFICULT TO DO AFTER YOU'VE MADE YOUR DECISIONS.

We also ask for the relationship of each person to your child, such as aunt or uncle or family friend and so on.

II. Your child will chant his/her Torah portion in three sets. For each of the first two sets there will be people who will come up as aliyot to chant or read blessings before and after the set. (Your child will do his/her own blessings for the third set.) You may ask either one or two people up for both the blessings before and the blessings after each set. Thus the blessing may be done by one person or be shared by two people if you wish. All of the people invited to do blessings before and after each set will come up to the Bimah together. We do ask that whenever possible you choose people who are familiar with these blessings to be the ones you ask to come up, although of course you are welcome to invite anyone you deem deserving of this special honor, provided that he/she is Jewish (biological or by choice) and over the age of Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

For this section we will need Hebrew names of the people on each line. The name should consist of the person's own name, such as Moshe, plus <u>both</u> of his/her parents' names, such as Moshe ben Avraham v'Sarah.

Please do put your child's full English and Hebrew names on his/her line as well.

III. During the Service there are three (3) separate occasions when the ark is opened. Each time the people who come up will open the doors of the ark, remain for the part of the service while the ark is open, and then close the doors. In each case you may invite either one of two people to come up as ark openers. (Non-Jewish relatives or friends may participate at this time.)

Page 244 is when we remove the Torah and pass it down to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah. We caution you that it does require that they stand for approximately 10 to 15 minutes. Please note that none of the people who pass down the Torah should do this ark opening, as that would mean they would have to be standing in two different places at once.

Page 256 is when we return the Torah to the ark at the end of the entire Torah service. At this time the Rabbi and Cantor will confer the Priestly Blessing on the Bar/Bat Mitzvah in the presence of the parents and siblings. You might wish to reserve this second ark opening for very special, close relatives (i.e. grandparents or aunt and uncle).

Page 282 is the *Aleinu* – the service of adoration. This is the third and last ark opening.

- IV. After the Torah is read it is held high by the Rabbi and then dressed in its mantle and shield. The (Jewish) person you ask to participate will either sit and hold the Torah in his/her lap or stand and dress it.
- V. This is an English prayer that often is said by a younger sibling. If there is no younger sibling or cousin, or if her/she is not yet reading age you may, of course, invite an adult to read.
